Native prairie was eliminated from most of the landscape by conversion for subsistence agriculture, but the plant communities in the early pioneer cemeteries were protected from the severe impacts on the surrounding landscape. In the foreground is a shrub of the Prairie Willow (*Salix humilis*) with Bluestem grasses (*Andropogon gerardii, Schizachyrium scoparium*), Black Oaks (*Quercus velutina*) on the right and native Red Pines (*Pinus resinosa*), common on the former plains, on the left.
